Tom has been painting since he was 10 years old. Born in Lowell and raised in Chelmsford, he started his professional career in 1982 after flirting with a rock musician career and after taking his fine art education at the Art Institute of Boston. Tom developed his own style, using acrylic paint mostly on canvas to express his emotions, using brush strokes that are full of energy. The result is always loose and impressive with harmonious colors that interplay with light. He teaches this style through entertaining demonstrations at art associations throughout New England.

Tom's painting style is inspired by John Singer Sargent, Norman Rockwell, Richard Schmid, and many others. He describes his style as impressionistic realism. He likes to work fast and paints figures in their own environments. He finishes his paintings spontaneously with what he calls "slap, dashes and dots." He holds Professional Memberships in the North Shore Art Association, Rockport Art Association, Whistler House Museum of Art, Chelmsford Art Society, Concord Art Association, and the Revolving Museum in Lowell.

LT. JERRY SCALLEY - A PROGRAM ON FORENSIC ART JANUARY 13, 2010

Lt. Gerard Scalley has been employed by the Woburn Police Department for the past 29 years. He holds a master's degree in Criminal Justice from the University of Massachusetts Lowell. Presently he is assigned to the detective bureau. He has received specialized training in Forensic Art, which is not limited to composite sketches but includes crime-scene sketching, post-mortem drawings, age progressions, and demonstrative evidence. A Power Point presentation and numerous sketches will highlight the lieutenant's talk, which promises to be extremely interesting, with touches of his keen sense of humor. It will be a fascinating glimpse of Art being used in the world of criminal investigation. Lt. Scalley has attended specialized training by Stuart Parks Forensic Associates, Karen T. Taylor at Scottsdale Artist School, The Center for Missing and Exploited Children, and the FBI training center in Quantico, VA. He is also studying with Kathy Cooper of Westford (President of the American Impressionist Society). Past instructors include Craig Srebnik of Somerville and Roberts Howard of Haverhill.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I was thinking how wonderful it is to share our love of the arts, and how we learn and grow from each other's experiences and talents. So I asked my friend **Florence Como** if she would write about her recent trip to Umbria with a group of artists. Here is her letter.

"This summer I spent 2 weeks at the La Romita School of Art in the Umbrian region of Italy. The 20 participants from different parts of the country were mostly watercolorists, but a few also painted in oils and acrylics.

"Each day a small bus took us to a different hill town, each with its own special charm, where we explored, took pictures of the ancient buildings, churches, piazzas, and the surrounding breathtaking vistas. It was sometimes difficult to decide what to paint since there was great subject matter at every turn. Eventually we spread out all over town and set up to paint what appealed to and inspired us individually. It was so much fun to sit for hours painting, trying to communicate with the people, and occasionally leaving the easel to go for a cappuccino or gelato.

"In some of the larger towns more emphasis was placed on sightseeing, visiting churches and museums, enjoying the artworks of the Umbrian School of Painting. Afterwards I loved to sit in a little café and sketch or do a small painting of the scene before me! Back at La Romita before dinner Carol Maddox, the instructor, a signature member of the American Watercolor Society, sometimes gave a demo or critique in the chapel of the Capuchin Monks, which was built in the 16th century. Dinner was always a sumptuous meal prepared by 3 Italian cooks who spent the greater part of each day cooking for us, using the olive oil from the many olive trees which surround La Romita. After dinner Edmund, the manager and poet, showed slides and gave a lecture about the place we would visit the next day. Sitting outdoors on the veranda on those warm summer evenings was very special.

"On 3 evenings we attended concerts—string quartet in a medieval church; 'La Traviata' at the Roman Ruins in Carsulae; and choral music with a jazz quartet in the small hill town of Montoro. A mini feast of Italian delicacies and wine was served around midnight after the concerts. Even the concerts offered inspiration for a painting. Each painting I did while I was there will always carry the memory of the sights, the people, the sounds, and the smells of the delicious foods as I sat at my easel in each beautiful hill town!"

We can all be inspired by going with a friend to sketch or paint outdoors at any of our beautiful North Shore areas!
